Sculptures & Statues



Bessie the Cow Arby's parking lot, 3501 Milton Ave Visit this fun fiberglass sculpture originally erected in 1966. This 16-foot tall, 20 foot long, one ton cow-lossus stood outside the Oasis until 2006, when the site was demolished for new construction. Moved just down the street, Bessie was given a new life - and a new paint job and continues to stand over Janesville, providing a unique photo opportunity.



New Life Assembly of God Cross New Life Assembly of God, 2416 N Wright Rd

Erected in 2013, this incredible cross stands 60 feet high and 40 feet wide and weighs 25,000 pounds. There are twelve commemorative benches around the oatio with a 100-foot commemorative walkway. Three rose gardens surround the cross and patio, along with over 80 trees and shrubs and hundreds of tulips and daffodils.



Janesville Gazette Mural Sculpture lanesville Gazette, 1 S Parker Dr Constantino Nivola; 1970

Sculpted from sand and concrete, this incredible mural over the entrance to the Gazette building represents the progress of communication through the age The mural is divided into 33 panels, each weighing approximately one ton.



War of the Rebellion Monument Lower Courthouse Park, 51 S Main St

The base of this monument says, "Rock County 1901 - Dedicated to the memory of her soldiers and sailors. War of the Rebellion, 1861-1865." The tall monument is topped by a statue of a Civil War soldier and weighs more than a ton.



bove the Blain Gilbertson Family Heritage Bridge. With seating on both banks as well as on the bridge itself, the pedestrian bridge connects the east and west halves of Downtown Janesville's Town Square and was created as part of ARISE Now.

The Bubbler Town Square, 65 S River St



This interactive water feature is part sculpture, part splash pad, part music and light show. For those unfamiliar with Wisconsin lingo, some locals use the word "bubbler" in place of "drinking fountain." The round shape, the water, and Wisconsin tradition all informed the name, chosen through a community contest. The 9-foot-tall metal sculpture includes electronically controlled water jets, colored lights, and music.

Spirit of the American Doughboy Statue 120 W Milwaukee St E. M. Viquesney; 1920s-1930s

This sculpture is a pressed copper sculpture that was mass produced for communities throughout the United States in the 1920s and 30s, with about 140 sculptures remaining. It was presented to the city of Janesville by the Lions Club in honor of the men and women who served in WWI and includes the names of those who served

Storybook Garden

Hedberg Public Library, 316 S Main St The Friends of Hedberg Library and the Noon Lions Club created this garden of books, featuring a variety of sculptures in a park setting along the river.

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Memorial

Veterans Memorial Plaza *Traxler Park, 600 N Main St* The Veterans Memorial Plaza contains numerous memorial monuments including a Gold Star Mother Monument, Purple Heart Medal Monument, Medal of Honor Veterans Walkway, Vietnam War Memorial, and Global War on Terrorism



9/11 Memorial Firehouse Park, 101 N Main St Located in Firehouse Park, this memorial honors the firefighters, police officers and paramedics who lost their lives as a result

of the 9/11 attacks. A concrete obelisk represents the World Trade Center, with a steel beam from one of the twin towers that came down branching off the obelisk in the direction of New York City.



O.V.Shaffer's work is exhibited throughout the United States, and several sculptures are on display in Janesville. Each piece has a sign that describes the art and includes a QR code that can be scanned by your phone, which will take you to a video of O.V. Shaffer speaking about that piece.



Calligraph Parker Building, 1 Parker Pl O.V.Shaffer; 1980

The large sculpture is constructed of velded brass sheets.



BMO Harris Bank, 111 N Parker Dr O. V. Shaffer; 1980 Located at BMO Harris Bank near the Parker Drive entrance, this large sculpture was constructed of stainless steel.



Hedberg Public Library, 316 S Main St O. V. Shaffer; 1968 Located at the entrance to the underground parking lot, the large sculpture is constructed of Cor-Ten steel



Rotary Botanical Gardens, 1455 Palmer Dr O. V. Shaffer; 1974

Located along Palmer Drive east of the Rotary Botanical Gardens parking lot, the sculpture is constructed of Cor-Ten steel. Parking is available off Sharon Rd. First Congregational Church, 54 S Jackson St

Church which stood on the site of this edifice 1848 - 1868.


The Wisconsin Historical Society marker #298 commemorates the 32nd Tank Company, which was headquartered at the Janesville National Guard armory in the 1930s. When the United States joined WWII, this company became the first of 330,000 Wisconsin residents to engage the enemy. The Janesville tank unit fought bravely alongside other American and Filipino soldiers in bravely alongside other American and Filipino soldiers in the Philippine islands until surrendering on April 9, 1942. As prisoners of war, the Janesville men participated in the infamous Bataan Death March. Of the original ninety-nine members of the unit, only thirty-five survived.

Rock River Industry I-39/I-90 Rest Area 17

accessible while traveling east/south on 1-39/1-90, as it is in Rest Area 17. This marker explains the impact the Rock River had on industry as it provided an early

Wisconsin Historical Society marker #107 was erected in 1961 and honors the Milton House Museum, a frontier inn, stagecoach stop, and station in the Underground Railroad. The Storrs Lake marker #229 was added in 1976 and is located on the side of the stable. It marks

the location of a camp of US soldiers during their pursuit of Black Hawk and more than 1,000 people during the Black Hawk War of 1832.

Carrie Jacobs Bond Marker

Carrie Jacobs Bond was born in Janesville in 1862, she went on to become a composer of popular music from the 1890s through the early 1940s, including the song "I Love You Truly," which sold over one million copies.

First State Fair

Wisconsin Historical Society marker #20 commemorates the location of the first Wisconsin State Fair, held October 1-2, 1851. The fairgrounds contained 6 acres

is located on the Ice Age Trail between the Blackhawk Golf Course parking lot and East Racine St. It makes note of the 1832 conflict between Sauk leader Black Hawk

47 Burr Robbins Circus

Softball Complex, the Wisconsin Historical Society marker #454 notes that this site served as the Spring Brook Farm winter quarters for the Burr Robbins Circus, once the third largest circus in America, from 1874-1888.

Route of Abraham Lincoln 1832 & 1859

commemorates two separate times Lincoln passed this way, first as part of the Illinois militia during the Black Hawk War, and again on his way to Janesville as a guest of William Tallman after delivering a political address in Beloit.

Young America Hall Site

This marker commemorates the site of Abraham Lincoln's speech at the Young America Hall on the night of October

Bataan War Memorial 120 W Milwaukee St


The memorial honors the local servicemen Death March during WWII. A list of the known as "the Janesville 99," is on the base of the memorial.

The grounds contains a Veterans Memorial, Memorial to Corporal Frank E. Hill, Memorial to the Soldiers at Bataan, and a Viet-Nam Veterans Memorial. These memorials incorporate a historical helicopter, tank, anchor, and weapons, and are located at the east side of the parking lot. An airplane and an eagle statue are at the driveway entrance.

Heart of the City Outdoor: Janesville Women's History

Rock County Courthouse, 51 S Main St Ronald Perry Wick, Cherry Valley, IL; 2010 Part of the "Heart of the City Outdoor Art Campaign" representing Janesville's early years, this vinyl printed mural commemorates the contributions women in Rock County. It covers the years 1860 to 1890, when women began having a significant impact on the social and economic life of the Janesville community. At the center is an early suffragist and her young daughter. At the top is Rhoda Lavinia Goodell, the first woman Lawyer in Wisconsin, admitted to the Rock County bar in 1874. Next is Angie King, Wisconsin's third female attorney and perhaps the first woman in Wisconsin to win a political office by popular election. Above a depiction of Oaklawn Hospital is Nellie Tallman, whose work with the Janesville Associated Charities led to the founding of Janesville's first successful hospital. The Janesville Cotton Manufacturing Company is shown at the left with two female mill workers. In the 1870s, twothirds of the labor force at the Cotton Mills was female. The books represent the first free public library in Janesville established by the Ladies Afternoon Club.

Sharing Aloha

808 Cheesecake, 119 W Milwaukee St (back, visible from Dodge St) Rob Reyes, Janesville, WI; 2021 Located in the alley on the back of 808 Cheesecake, this lush, tropical mural was painted by the owner. Both the mural and the shop offer a taste of the Hawaiian Islands.

Waves of Giving Hometown Pharmacy, 21 S Jackson St (back, visible from Franklin St) Jaime Brown with Karim Jabbari; Art Infusion 2020

This colorful, geometric mural is full of symbolism. The arrows on the top represent the forward thinking of the city while the zigzags are the river running through downtown. The diamonds on the right are a stalk of wheat, from Janesville's early days as an agricultural community. The horizontal bars on the bottom are for the fallen tree trunks during the city's lumber/industrial period. The vertical lines represent train tracks, and the intersecting purple circles are a woman looking down and working on something. She could be making a quilt or dinner. The woman is often the heartbeat of the home, and homes and families are the heartbeat of the

Midnight Snack aka Blue Barry Home Again Consignments, 215 W Milwaukee St (back, visible from alley) Bigshot Robot (David Mark Zimmerman), Milwaukee, WI; Art Infusion 2020

This whimsical mural wraps around two sides in the alley behind the building and is best viewed on foot. What shall Blue Barry's snack be - a wish bone, dog bone, fish bone - maybe a trombone?


Formations on Jackson Forward Foundation, 14 S Jackson St Nathan Brown, Nashville, TN; Art Infusion 2021

This beautiful geometric mural is a combination of strong shapes and vibrant color gradients.

Butterfly 314 W Milwaukee St (side, visible from Jackson St) 37

This mural depicts a butterfly emerging from a chrysalis and flying away. The oldest of the murals on this list, artist details are unknown.

The Adventurer Bigshot Robot (David Mark Zimmerman), Milwaukee, WI; Art Infusion 2021

The Adventurer is a light-hearted addition to Janesville's downtown. Covering one side of the Harris Ace Hardware building with vibrant colors, the mural is best seen from a little distance - even across the river! The mural symbolizes the adventuring spirit of the indigenous people, who had lived here, and the people who visit the downtown on their own adventures.



Janesville Performing Arts Center, 408 S Main St Ruben Aguirre, Chicago, IL; Art Infusion 2021

Dancing on the Stars

This dynamic mural on the side of the Janesville Performing Arts Center depicts movement expressed by dancers. The artist interpreted pieces of the City of Janesville flag: on the left side is the tree and the suns represent the four stars. The dancers represent the Performing Arts Center.

Nancy Platner, Edgerton, WI; 2016 This 15-foot by 60-foot patriotic mural is located on the Wall St side of the Whiskey Ranch. It was the first large scale mural for this artist and took over 80

The locket worn by the woman on the left bears the image of Harriet Tubman, a nod to the abolitionist sentiment in Janesville, which hosted speakers Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass in 1859, as well as the nearby Milton House, a documented Underground Railroad stop that is now a museum. The large and small feathers in the native American woman's hair represent elders' support, guidance, and protection for

youth. The wolf represents running with a pack or tribe, and the galaxy of stars above



Olde Towne Mall, 20 S Main St (back,



Local record shop the Exclusive Company has had a series of paintings on the side of the building for many years. In 2017 they completed a mural "reboot," replacing the old mural with a new one that represents artists from different genres and eras. 

Part of the "Heart of the City Outdoor Art Campaign," each representing a decade during Janesville's early years and focusing on the important industries of that time, this vinyl printed mural represents 1840-50 and evokes how generations of Janesville citizens harnessed the power of water to manufacture goods, and how the city's economic success was dependent on this natural resource. Also on display is the historic Frances Willard Schoolhouse, once located along the Rock River and now residing at the Rock County Historical Society Campus.

Depicting the artist's interpretation of Black Hawk, a leader and warrior of the Sauk American Indian tribe in what is now Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin, this incredible mural was created with spray paint in just 10 days. It also incorporates an image of Miracle, the White Buffalo, who was born outside Janesville in the 1990s and was a sacred Native American symbol who drew visitors from around the world. A Native American ceremony marked the mural's completion.





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This mural is reminiscent of vintage postcards and celebrates Janesville, including our proud General Motors and Parker Pen legacy, the historic Lincoln-Tallman House, and present-day wonders like the Rotary Botanical Garden and the Rock Aqua Jays waterski show team.



This incredible 100-foot-long mural features a flowing river with an owl for wisdom, flowers symbolizing transformation and vines representing time and energy. The thorns represent the obstacles in life that we go through that make us who we are.
